Message from the Executive Director and Board Chair



This past year reminded us that meaningful change is rarely loud or dramatic. More often, it happens through steady commitment, thoughtful leadership, and people showing up for one another again and again. That spirit has defined ABLE2 throughout 2025.

It was a year that asked a great deal of our organization. We navigated staffing transitions, capacity constraints, and one of the most competitive fundraising environments we have experienced. As a result, we were required to make thoughtful, sometimes difficult choices, pausing or deferring some initiatives in order to protect core services and respond to immediate needs. This was not a setback, but a reflection of disciplined stewardship and clarity of purpose. Even amid these pressures, ABLE2 moved forward with intention, resilience, and heart.

Through our programs and services, we continued to support people with disabilities and their families with care, determination, and a deep belief in belonging. In 2025, we made deliberate choices to focus our capacity where it could have the greatest impact—strengthening core systems, refining volunteer coordination, and investing in areas where demand was most acute. One of the clearest examples of progress this year was in the Matching Program, where efforts focused on intake processes, volunteer recruitment, and new investment, which helped reduce the waitlist by 26%.

At the same time, we strengthened the foundation of our volunteer program, responding to feedback and community needs by expanding bilingual onboarding resources, increasing Francophone engagement, and improving service consistency across programs. Volunteer applications continued to grow as a result of clearer pathways into service and more visible community outreach. Reach Legal Referral Services returned to full operation after a period of transition, and across programs we laid important groundwork for future growth, prioritizing sustainability, responsiveness, and quality of support.

Behind every number is something much more important: a person seeking connection, support, stability, or hope. That is what continues to drive this work. ABLE2 exists because community matters and because every person deserves to be seen, valued, and included. This year, our staff, volunteers, and partners continued to bring that belief to life in quiet and powerful ways every single day.

We also made important strides internally as an organization, guided by the understanding that strong systems are essential to sustainable impact. As ABLE2 completed Year 2 of its strategic plan, we continued strengthening the systems needed to support our people and programs over the long term. *(continued)*

(continued) New salary bands were approved, a placement matrix was finalized, job descriptions were updated, and the Human Resources Handbook was modernized for a fully remote workplace.

In September, ABLE2 transitioned fully to a remote operational model—a significant milestone that improved organizational resilience, flexibility, and long-term sustainability. While these changes may be less visible externally, they are foundational to our ability to attract and retain talented staff, respond more nimbly to community needs, and steward resources responsibly. Investing in our internal capacity ensures we can continue showing up, effectively and consistently, for the people and families who rely on us.

Funding pressures in 2024 revealed the need for more predictable and stable funding to sustain ABLE2's work. In response, 2025 became a year of focused effort, strengthening fundraising infrastructure, increasing public-facing communications, and building deeper relationships with donors and funders. These strategic shifts resulted in measurable growth across fundraising, communications, and public awareness.

ABLE2 secured more than \$722,000 in grant funding and increased total donations to close to \$100,000; both meaningful signs of confidence in our work. Our Giving Tuesday and year-end campaign brought renewed energy to donor engagement, while our communications efforts expanded ABLE2's reach through stronger digital storytelling, increased media visibility, targeted social campaigns, and a growing public voice. By year-end, online engagement had increased significantly, particularly in the final months, allowing us to connect with new supporters and amplify the importance of inclusion, accessibility, and community connection.

We are proud of what was accomplished, but we are equally proud of how it was accomplished. This progress was made through the commitment of an extraordinary team, the generosity of donors and funders, the leadership of our Board, the compassion of our volunteers, and the trust of the people and families who engage with ABLE2 every day. It was built through partnership, persistence, and a shared belief that inclusive communities are stronger communities.

To our members, funders, volunteers, and partners, thank you for being part of this work. Your support, advocacy, and encouragement help sustain not only this organization, but the values at the heart of it. ABLE2 has always been about more than programs. It is about relationships. It is about opening doors. It is about ensuring that people with disabilities have opportunities to build lives of meaning and joy, and to be recognized for all they contribute to our community.

As we look to 2026, we do so with hope. We know there is more work to do. We know the needs in our community remain significant. But we also know that ABLE2 is moving forward with momentum. We are stronger than we were a year ago. We are learning, adapting, and continuing to grow. Most of all, we remain deeply committed to our mission and to the people at the center of it.

Thank you for walking alongside us. Together, we are building a community where all people are seen as able, important, and valued.

2025 Impact

2025 was a year of bold progress at ABLE2—progress made possible because of you. Your generosity strengthened our programs, expanded our reach, and helped us support people with disabilities in more meaningful and accessible ways.

This year also marked one of our most significant milestones: the transition to fully remote operations. We made this shift confidently because donors, partners, and community members like you believed in our mission. Your trust allowed us to remove barriers, reach more people across the region, and deliver services directly where they were needed.

Your support also elevated ABLE2's presence across Ottawa. Through creative partnerships and influencer collaborations, we tripled our media visibility, bringing disability inclusion into more conversations and public spaces. We showed up where advocacy and community mattered most, from Pride events to key roundtables, bringing a lens of solidarity and intersectional representation. Our presence was not only about advancing inclusion, but also about standing alongside communities and causes that affect us all.

In 2025, 1,191 people were supported through ABLE2 services. The Matching Program reduced waitlists by 26%, and families accessing the Fetal Alcohol Resource Program received support 19 months sooner. Funding Brokerage served 80% more individuals, the Housing Support Program reached 140% more people, and Reach Legal Referral Services processed 124% more legal intakes. This impact was further strengthened by 453 volunteers, who contributed over 15,000 hours.

Every milestone we reached in 2025 was possible because of you. Your belief in inclusion and your commitment to people with disabilities powered every step forward. Thank you for helping build a community where everyone is seen as able, important, and valued.

A Lifeline Through Friendship: Colleen & Sheena

Sheena had spent years grappling with mental health issues, constantly feeling the crippling isolation and loneliness. “I used to be in the hospital every few months. It’s not always obvious, but people with mental illness do need support,” she reflects.

In 2010, Sheena was referred to ABLE2’s Matching Program to expand her social connections in the community. “I’m lucky that ABLE2 acknowledged my mental illness as a disability and was there for me from the beginning. Since being matched with Colleen, I’ve only been hospitalized twice in 15 years.” Having a friend in Colleen—someone who listens, laughs, and shows up—has been life-changing for Sheena.

“Colleen and I, we’re tight. She’s like a big sister. It’s nice to have this support,” Sheena shares. “And she doesn’t judge me, that’s the big one. I have multiple diagnoses, and she never says, ‘Why did you do this to yourself, Sheena?’ She doesn’t judge at all.” Colleen has been a steady anchor in moments of uncertainty and a lifeline when she needed it most.

Colleen, a Special Education teacher at the time, had been looking for meaningful opportunities to give back to the community—especially as retirement approached. She learned about ABLE2’s Matching Program through a colleague who had been a long-time volunteer, and seeing how this one-on-one intentional match had a direct impact on the person with a disability, Colleen knew she wanted to be involved. Colleen and Sheena were eventually matched, and 15 years later their friendship is going stronger and deeper than ever.



At first, Colleen saw the match as a one-way relationship where she would be supporting Sheena. What she didn’t anticipate was how deeply the relationship would enrich her own life. “It just made me realize that after so many years, I haven’t really thought about Sheena’s diagnosis anymore. She’s my friend, she’s my Sheena,” Colleen says with a smile.

“And I can easily say that I’ve gotten just as much out of it as Sheena has. I’ve gone through some big life changes. I lost my mom last year, and Sheena was very supportive through those times. Sheena is one of the stronger persons I know, and she inspires me every day.”

Over the years, they’ve shared countless moments together. They’ve gone hiking in Gatineau, attended ABLE2’s events such as the Annual Picnic and the Holiday Dinner and Dance, and even found a shared love for Aquafit classes. Their bond has even extended into a larger circle of friendship, often joining other matches for social outings. Sheena shares, “I’ve been able to go out in the community and do social things with other friends.”

“I didn’t have that before; I didn’t have anybody. Now it’s better. I’m not struggling anymore. I just wanted to be happy, and now, I am,” shares Sheena.

The Power of Being Seen: Kelly-Anne & Maria's Friendship

For most of her life, Kelly-Anne has heard the same thing over and over: “But you don’t look disabled.” What most people don’t see is her strength and the courage it takes to face a world not built for invisible disabilities.

Kelly-Anne lives with an invisible disability. She has difficulty reading, writing, navigating directions, and math, which feels nearly impossible for her. Throughout her life, she’s also dealt with mental health challenges. But because there are no physical markers of her disability, people assume that she’s simply not trying hard enough. “People get impatient when you can’t count change correctly at checkout. They don’t realize that taking the bus is terrifying when you can’t always read the numbers or understand the signs.”

Over the years, Kelly-Anne has watched resources go to others and experienced being left out of programs, always pushed to the back of the line to “give way for those who need it more.” She has had to constantly explain herself, yet never wanted to be a burden to others. “I learned to make myself smaller, to put my own needs last, and pretend I was fine.”

Throughout her school years, she found herself caught in the middle— too capable for the general support system for people with disabilities or not disabled enough for another. She was pushed to the margins, dismissed, and judged by those who could not see what she was struggling with. Because of this, Kelly-Anne became profoundly self-aware, learning to read rooms and anticipate rejection. She braced herself for the moment when people would realize she wasn’t what they expected.

When Kelly-Anne came to ABLE2, she was hesitant. She was afraid to believe that the program would truly consider her as someone who deserved support. But she came anyway, because deep down, she knew she needed to try something different. She knew she wanted to find a genuine connection with someone outside of her family. What she found was beyond what she dreamed of.

“ABLE2 saw me,” Kelly-Anne says. “For the first time in my life, I heard the words: ‘Your disability is real. Your needs matter just as anyone else’s.’”

Through ABLE2’s Matching Program, she met Maria — not just any volunteer, but someone carefully matched to her through a rigorous, intentional process. Maria didn’t just put in hours or go through the motions. She genuinely wanted to get to know Kelly-Anne and build a friendship.

Today, Maria and Kelly-Anne’s friendship has evolved into something neither expected. “Maria is my best friend,” says Kelly-Anne. They explore the city just as friends do— visiting museums, taking pottery classes, and watching movies. They share a love for cats and even wore matching cat-embroidered shirts to their interview. They share lots of laughs, learn about each other’s worlds, and see perspectives they never would have discovered on their own.

“For the first time in 49 years, I don’t feel invisible anymore,” reflects Kelly-Anne.

Volunteer Impact

ABLE2 volunteers continued to create meaningful waves of change throughout 2025, coming together to uplift and enrich the lives of people with disabilities in our community. This year, we proudly partnered with 453 dedicated volunteers who collectively contributed 15,225 hours of service in support of inclusion, connection, and justice.

Volunteers are at the heart of ABLE2's mission. Through the Matching and Connect Programs, Allies nurture lasting relationships rooted in trust and mutual respect. Legal professionals and students collaborate through Reach Legal Referral Services to break down barriers and ensure access to justice. Our volunteers also strengthen ABLE2 behind the scenes—planning signature events like Evening in the Maritimes, offering leadership and governance through the Board of Directors, and fundraising to sustain and grow our programs.

The impact of this collective effort is profound. Every hour volunteered fuels opportunity, deepens community, and advances self-determination. Our volunteers' generosity and allyship strengthen not only ABLE2, but the broader community we serve.

As we reflect on 2025, we celebrate the shared impact of all our volunteers who champion inclusivity and accessibility through their service. I've been volunteering with ABLE2 since 2007, and the experience has had a real impact on my life. What initially drew me to ABLE2 was its mission—to connect vulnerable and isolated individuals in our community with volunteers who can be their friends and allies. That simple but powerful idea continues to inspire me.

My first match was with John, who at the time had no close family and was living in a group home. We became close friends. John lived with disabilities, and while I could support him at times, the real value was simply in spending time together—sharing stories, laughs, and everyday experiences. Our friendship lasted until his passing in 2019, and I still think of him often.

Since then, I've been matched with Dennis, and more recently with Larry in 2022. Each friendship is unique, and each one has added something special to my life. These aren't just volunteer roles—they are real, enduring relationships rooted in trust and mutual respect.

In addition to volunteering, I also served on the board of ABLE2 for six years. That experience gave me a close-up view of the organization's inner workings.

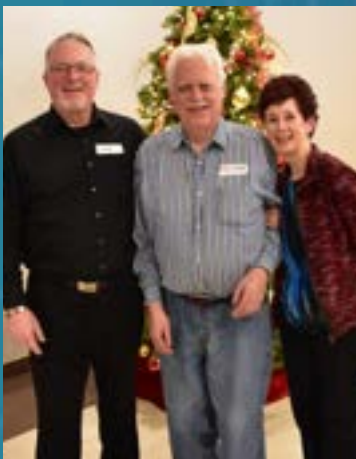
